If you have a breast implant and have been invited for breast screening you may be unsure whether or not this is suitable for you. This leaflet is intended to give you some information and advice.

You will be offered an appointment at the screening centre so that your mammograms (x-rays) can be checked for technical quality before you leave. This cannot be done on the mobile units. The technique used by the mammographer to take your mammogram may need to vary so it is important that you let her know that you have an implant before you are screened.

The aim of the breast screening programme is to detect small cancers, so it is important that the mammograms show as much breast tissue as possible. Breast implants can sometimes hide tissue. If necessary there are techniques which can be used by the mammographer to get the best possible result. As noted in the information leaflet accompanying your invitation letter a small number of cancers may not be seen on mammograms.

There is a slight risk of damage to implants during this procedure. If you wish to discuss this further then please contact the screening centre who will provide more information on the procedure. Breast screening does not involve a check on your implant.
